A Word From Pastor Brad

Church,

I came upon this Lenten parable recently and found it very intriguing. There's a universal message here that can speak to all of us. As we journey to the cross with Jesus what are you learning along the way in this season of your life? Pray about that. Enjoy this reflection from Seth Richardson.

There once was a woman who had come to know Jesus as a teenager. She genuinely experienced God's forgiveness through the cross of Christ. She turned her life completely over to God.

The immediate fruit of her conversion was evident. Her life was truly transformed from the way she once lived. And she continued to grow and mature as a follower of Jesus. God felt very near to her. She was full of energy and fervor for God's kingdom. The movements of the Spirit in her life were palpable. She prayed frequently – studied scripture – served her neighbors.

This was all genuine and good. She took her faith seriously. She was certainly not a "consumer Christian."

But as the years went by, the sermons got more familiar – the podcasts from famous Christian preachers less stirring – God seemed more frequently and increasingly distant. Doubt occasionally crept into her heart. And while God had truly, radically changed her heart at her conversion, there were areas of her life – places of brokenness – that continued to persist despite her longing to experience change. Her once vibrant faith felt increasingly dry and lifeless.

Even more frustrating, she could not explain why this was happening. She did not know how to relate to the angst and fear nestled quietly in the depths of her soul – to the residual guilt and shame in the corners of her heart. She did not want to become resigned to this place of dryness like she had seen so many other Christians do – who, because of the burdens of life, find it easier to hit cruise control – to name the dryness as normal and paper-over it with a layer of religious niceness.





But one day a new world of spirituality was opened to her – the world of spiritual formation and discipleship – with a closet full of spiritual disciplines that have characterized the lives of the faithful for several millennia: contemplation, solitude, fasting, serving the poor, silence, simplicity, liturgy. New books to digest, concepts to master, prayers to pray, liturgical seasons to observe! A treasure trove of sacred practices that would surely take her deeper than she had ever been – that would surely breathe fresh life into what felt like dry, dead bones.

So she jumped-in headfirst.

Truly I tell you, although those spiritual disciplines and practices are good and necessary, they do not bring new life.

They do not, on their own, have the power to relieve the burden of spiritual dryness. When obedience becomes a technique to fix our anxiety and brokenness, it is nothing more than dependence on the self – not on Jesus. No matter how ancient, good, and helpful these practices can be, when we enter into them thinking *that they will fix us* and make us better Christians, they will only ever lead to moralism and spiritual death.

Too often we enter into Lenten disciplines having never learned to trust God with our brokenness, in the midst of the tension. This is a great danger. Lenten disciplines can actually be tools for avoiding the very places where I need God's grace the most: my guilt, failure and shame.

When I reach the place, as I often do, that this woman reached, I cannot continue to run from, avoid, or fix my dryness and brokenness, even if that running, avoiding and fixing comes in the "holiest" of packages. The best thing I can do this Lent is learn to embrace my dryness and brokenness as God's gift to me. I can do this trusting the good news that God wants to take me on a journey deeper into his love.

This Lent, God wants to take me down – as a wise man once told me – the most loving take-down I've ever had. Will I surrender to him today?



Holy Week 2018



Good Friday is the Friday before Easter on which the crucifixion of Jesus is remembered. Good Friday services focus upon prayer and reflection on the death of Christ and penance and special devotion for the believer. It is a day that proclaims God's purpose of loving and redeeming the world through the cross of our Lord, Jesus Christ. It is a day that is good because God was drawing the world to God's self in Christ. As seen in John's gospel, particularly, God was in control. God was not making the best of a bad situation, but was working out God's intention for the world — winning salvation for all people. We call it "good" because we look backward at the crucifixion through the lens of Easter!

Maundy Thursday is the first of the three days of solemn remembrance of the events leading up to and immediately following the crucifixion of Jesus. The English word "Maundy" comes from the Latin mandatum, which means "commandment." As recorded in John's gospel, on his last night before his betrayal and arrest, Jesus washed the feet of his disciples and then gave them a new commandment to love one another as he had loved them (John 13:34). This is why services on this night generally include the washing of feet or other acts of physical care as an integral part of the celebration.

Washing feet is not a part of our culture now, but what would be considered an act of "foot washing" today?

What physical acts of care are you practicing that would be obedient to this new commandment?



Stations of the Cross

Sunday, March 25-31 8:30 AM-4:00 PM

For centuries Christians have made pilgrimages along the Via Dolorosa, the Way of the Cross, stopping at 14 stations to remember and honor Christ's last agonizing passage to Calvary. The worship team is setting up the 14 'Stations of the Cross" during Holy Week, beginning with Palm Sunday, March 25, and ending after the Good Friday luncheon, March 30. Everyone is encouraged to experience this very moving, visual, tactile, hands-on replica of Jesus' Journey to the Cross. It is to be done slowly, with reverence, reading the passage and doing the activity that is suggested. Begin with Station I; there will be a brochure there to guide you through your own "journey" and it is our hope you will be greatly blessed.
